


Take advantage of the assistance and advice available to you

### You have the work experience that employers are looking for

Nearly two-thirds of employers said that relevant experience was essential when hiring. Your work experience shows that:



You have a good work history



You are capable and work-ready



You have references

Remember, you need to explain *how* your experience is relevant to every job you apply for

75% of employers place at least as much emphasis, if not more, on personal qualities than they do on technical skills

### Essential employability skills:

- ✓ Interpersonal & people skills
- ✓ Communication & teamwork skills
- ✓ Enthusiasm & a positive attitude
- √ Adaptability & resilience
- ✓ Reliability & motivation
- ✓ Organisation & planning skills


### How employers recruited in Australia, 12 months to March 2023













Use your networks! Around **one** in **four** employers filled a job with someone they knew.

This is even higher in regional areas.

### You need a good résumé and application

- Research the job and the business beforehand
- Emphasise your experience and skills target/tailor your application and résumé to every job
- √ Keep your résumé simple and short (2-3 pages)
- ✓ Make sure it's up-to-date with your recent work experience
- ✓ Double- and triple-check spelling and grammar



**Give examples** from your current job. **Explain** how your skills and experience will allow you to do the job.

## Prepare for the interview

- Practise with family or friends
- Be on time and dress appropriately
- ✓ Communicate well and be enthusiastic
- ✓ Explain what you can bring to the job.
- ✓ Think about examples of your skills and experience.
- ✓ Ask questions about the job



Employers want to know who they will be working with!

The interview is your opportunity to make a good first impression

### Also be ready to apply online for jobs



#### Hints for online job applications:

- Make your CV/résumé software friendly by using a simple format and including key words
- Read instructions carefully so you don't miss any steps
- Check that your responses for online applications are well thought out and don't include any errors

#### Top tips for video interviews:

- Know where you will do a video interview find a quiet location with a plain backdrop and good lighting
- Dress for success choose a professional outfit, like you would for an interview in-person
- Test your internet connection, audio and webcam before you start

#### Australian Skills Classification

Explore the Australian Skills Classification (ASC) to see the different skills applied in different occupations and which occupations share similar skills.

Jobs and Skills Australia (JSA) is preparing a capacity study on the workforce needs for Australia's transition to a clean energy economy.

#### Clean Energy Capacity Study

#### **Employment Region Dashboards** and Profiles

JSA develops a range of resources to provide insights on the labour market and employment conditions across Australia.

#### Internet Vacancy Index

The Internet Vacancy Index (IVI) is a monthly count of online job advertisements. Data are available by occupational groups, skill level groups, state or territory and by regional areas.

#### Labour Market Updates

JSA analyses different sources of labour market information to provide insights into workforce and employment trends. Information includes the Labour Force Survey.

#### Nowcast of Employment by Region and Occupation (NERO)

The Nowcast of Employment by Region and Occupation (NERO) is an experimental dataset providing timely information on employment in 355 occupations across 88 Australian regions.

#### Recruitment Experiences and Outlook Survey

JSA surveys approximately 1,200 employers each month to find out about their experiences when recruiting staff and whether they are expecting to increase staffing levels.

#### Small Area Labour Markets

JSA produces quarterly Small Area Labour Markets (SALM) estimates of unemployment and the unemployment rate.

#### **VET Qualification Similarity Analysis**

Explore the VET similarity analysis product to identify any similarities between more than 1300 VET training package qualifications.




